

St Mary's Cemetery

Over the last few days the cemetery grass has been cut and the grounds tidied up. As many know, the cemetery is maintained by the Community Payback Team, and we are very grateful to them for the work they do in the cemetery. The cemetery grass will now be cut more regularly, and we thank them for all their commitment and effort.

The Bell of St Mary's

The Daughters of Charity accepted an estimate for £189.9s.4d from John Taylor, Bell Founders, of Loughborough for the casting and hanging of a 29 hundredweight bell in the new spire above the entrance to the church. Cast in bell bronze, an alloy made up of 79% copper and 21% tin, the bell sounded the note D flat, was 44 inches in diameter and weighed 30cwt and 13lbs on completion. The estimated cost had been dependent on the exact weight of the finished bell therefore the final expenditure would have been considerably more than the original figure.

In early 1910 the Sisters presented this bell to the Church with the Latin inscription:

JOHANNES TAYLOR ME FECIT
MARIA IMMAC., ME TIBI DONO
DEDERUNT SORORES CARITATIS.
DICAVIT SUP. CONG. MISS.
APUD LANARK,
VIII KAL. APR. AD MCMX

I WAS MADE BY JOHN TAYLOR
O MARY IMMACULATE
THE SISTERS OF CHARITY HAVE
PRESENTED ME TO THEE AS A GIFT.
THE SUPERIOR OF THE CONGREGATION
OF THE MISSION AT LANARK
DEDICATED ME ON 25th MARCH 1910

In John Taylor's casting book there is a note of the old bell from Lanark, weighing 2cwt and 17lbs, being scrapped. Unfortunately it was not taken to Loughborough until after the new bell was installed and so it was not used in the casting of the new bell.

During the First World War there were some regulations on bell ringing, but they varied from place to place. It is not known if St Mary's was affected by these rules. However, there was a total ban on bell ringing throughout Britain during part of World War 2. From 1940 bells could only be rung as a warning of invasion. Ringing bells to celebrate the victory at El Alamein in 1942 and at Christmas 1942 were exceptions to this rule. The ban was finally lifted on church service ringing in June 1943.


Over the years there have been four different methods of striking St Mary's bell. Originally, the bell was hung for full circle ringing using the manufacturers standard fittings - no mean feat for that weight of bell. Then in January 1911, less than a year from the bell being finished, an 'Ellacombe' hammer was installed. This would have been much easier to operate. However, in 1914 it was changed again by Matthew O'Byrne, Bell Founders, Dublin who installed a 'Byrne's Patent Rotary Iron Mounting' to facilitate the ringing of the bell. In his time Brother Francis McDonald greatly appreciated this as it was his responsibility to 'pull the rope'. A man of slight build, he was known to enlist the help of senior altar servers from time to time. The Angelus was rung daily at noon and children in school stood to recite the prayer, and when it tolled for funerals the De Profundis was said. On Sundays and Holydays of Obligation it sounded to call parishioners to Mass.

The last mechanism served for over 40 years until Robert Kennedy, a local electrician, built and installed an electromechanical machine for ringing the bell. The bell could now be rung by operating a switch in the area above the crypt rather than pulling an a rope. The ring note, D flat, stayed constant despite the changes.

Following the bell's conversion to automatic there was a dramatic incident. Just before Christmas an engineer was in the bell tower, beside the bell, installing loud speakers to broadcast Christmas Carols when someone in the house

switched on the bell. He was subjected to extreme noise and the subsequent trauma of such a situation. Fortunately his colleague was down below and , realising what had happened, was able to switch off the bell at the electric motor, much to the engineer's relief.

Half a century later, the bell mechanism is once more in need of renewal. Smith of Derby are the specialist firm contracted, not only to restore the original bell bur to full working order, but also to add an electronic system which will increase the total capacity to fifteen notes thus permitting a repertoire appropriate for a range of occasions. As with the original bell the Daughters of Charity have financed this new system with a donation of £3,800. It is planned that the installation be completed in time for the Centenary celebrations so that its peals of welcome will once more resound over Lanark.
