INTRODUCTION TO THE MASS Today's liturgy focuses on John the Baptist. Luke situates his coming in the secular history of his time pointing out that the salvation of which he speaks takes place in the reality of the human situation. This is true also for us in our own experiences of salvation.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight. And all mankind shall see the salvation of God. Alleluia!

Gospel (Lk 3:1-6). Emerging from the obscurity of the desert onto the stage of human history, John the Baptist calls for repentance and renewal of life.

FAITH IN FOCUS: TWO REASONS TO HOPE

When God first agreed to be our ancestors' God, by signing the covenant, he said it would be based on two things: "hesed and emeth". These two Hebrew words mean "steadfast love and faithfulness".

Even a fool can see that our ancestors didn't take long to break their side of the agreement. They soon forgot that their "special relationship" with God depended on how they behaved, how they responded to God's favour by the way they treated him and other people.

So you might think that God would have torn up the covenant and declared it null and void. But God remembered his part of the bargain, those two things: steadfast love and faithfulness. God never stopped being loving and faithful, whatever his people got up to. No matter how far people strayed, God remained steadfast and faithful.



This dual characteristic of God, steadfastness and faithfulness, is the reason why Christians trust God. It is the basis of Christian hope.

Our Advent liturgy today invites us to deepen this sense of hope. Don't be miserable, says the prophet Baruch, don't go around sad and distressed because your God is coming to set things right. Advent looks forward to the fulfilment of the promises that God has made to us. And God is steadfast and faithful.

But Christian hope is not merely about the future. It's not like the vague hope that one day we might win the lottery. It affects how we live our lives today, because the seeds of the future are based on my relationships here and now. Hope shines a new light on this reality. It's a dynamic gift that stops us from closing in on ourselves and instead spurs us on to new beginnings, to new challenges and to new life. We live by faith; we continue through charity; we flourish in hope.

The hope we entertain is not simply an optimism that Jesus will return at the end of time, but is a conviction that here and now he can come into our lives as Messiah and can set us free from whatever weighs us down. And come he will if we invite him. For he is steadfast and faithful.

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT (C)

Take off your dress of sorrow and distress... What marvels the Lord works for us... Be pure and blameless for the day of Christ... Prepare a way for the Lord...



There are mountains that need to come down: mountains of racism, sexism, ageism, and any other "ism" that blocks our way to healthy relationships with one another and with our Lord. There are valleys to be filled, valleys of depression, despair, loneliness, grief, pain, any of which can keep us from the rich relationship the Saviour offers and that keep us from enjoying the fellowship of the faith. There are crooked places to be made straight. Yes, there is perversity, even among those we might never imagine. Fine exteriors mask rotten interiors of abuse, neglect, immorality, even violence. There are rough places to be made smooth, rough places that have come because of oppression and injustice. (James Westmoreland)
