INTRODUCTION TO THE MASS Through our baptism we are members of the Christian community, the Body of Christ. Everything we do must work for the growth of this community, we must respond to the needs of the community from our inner motivation, not because the rules say so. Law is important for organising any society but it must become an expression of our own values. We pray therefore that through God's love within us our efforts may lead to a growth of peace and unity among men.



LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading (Neh 8:2-6, 8-10). Ezra reads the Law to the people, who listen closely and understand it. This understanding leads to penance, conversion and joy.

Responsorial Psalm: Your words are spirit, Lord, and they are life.

Second Reading (1 Cor 12:12-30). Paul uses the analogy of the body to describe the Christian community, the Church. It is a living organism which works in harmony.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! The Lord has sent me to bring Good News to the poor, to proclaim liberty to the captives. Alleluia!

Gospel (Lk 1:1-4, 4:14-21). Luke opens his Gospel by giving the principles on which he is working. We then hear the beginning of the scene in the synagogue at Nazareth with Jesus proclaiming the nature of his mission; he is the fulfilment of a passage from Isaiah promising freedom to the poor and oppressed.

FAITH IN FOCUS: ABOUT TO START

In some of our cities we have a church on almost every street corner. But in the whole of Israel there was only one Temple and that was in Jerusalem. The priests went there to offer sacrifices for people's sins and needs. But in every place where at least ten men could meet, no matter how small a village it might be, there was a synagogue. Every Sabbath there was a simple liturgical service that took place there and was led by the local community members. It was a plain affair with readings from the Jewish scriptures followed by a commentary on them in the form of a homily or sermon.

It was to one of these places that Jesus went when he returned to his hometown of Nazareth. He read a text from Isaiah about

being anointed to bring freedom to those who were oppressed in different ways. Then he made the incredible claim that this text was being fulfilled here and now as his audience listened.

Even though Jesus had gathered a reputation already as something of a preacher, this proved too much for his listeners and next Sunday we'll see what happened. But for today, what was Jesus really claiming?

In a nutshell he was claiming that a new age was beginning. In the Old Testament people had been waiting for "eschatological" times, times that would usher in a new age when God's kingdom would hold sway. There would be signs that this new age was about to begin: prisoners would be set free, the lame would walk, the deaf hear and the blind see again. Every fifty years the Jews held an amnesty year in which the slate was wiped clean, debts were settled and property returned to rightful owners. Jesus tells his audience that here and now one of these amnesties is about to start; it will be the Lord's year of favour.

Over the next few weeks, and throughout the gospel of Luke, we will see that Jesus has inaugurated this new age of favour between God and his people. And we'll discover that it was to last more than a year. Today as the gospel is proclaimed in our churches God still offers this favour. If you want to, you can make it happen for you even as you listen to God's word. Or you can wait and see how the people responded next week in Luke's gospel.

WORD FOR TODAY

We get ourselves into so many different tight corners, do things that we wish we hadn't and end up stressed out. Wouldn't it be wonderful if there could be a day set aside for wiping the slate clean for all our actions and setting right our relationship with God and others? There is. It's called the Lord's time of favour. And it's today.

The reason that I am bringing this to your attention is that around Christmas time a church was badly affected by a fire caused by the overloading of the votive candle stand. While the damage caused by fire wasn't great, the damage caused by smoke was great. The cost of repairs and clean-up of the church is estimated to be in excess of £75,000. There have been a number of church fires caused by candles over the past couple of years and the total cost of these repairs is well in excess of £1 million.
