#### **Parish Coffee Mornings & Light Bite**

As well as developing the spiritual aspect of the parish it is so important to continue to encourage parishioners to celebrate the social aspect too. An easy way to do this is to attend the Monthly Coffee Mornings or Light Bite after Sunday Mass. It is good to come together and meet new people or spend time with people we already know. A massive thank you to all those who do an incredible job each month organising and catering for all those who attend.

As winter is approaching homemade soup will be on offer at the Coffee Morning next week.

#### **Mass Census Figures**

For the last 12 months we have been carrying out the census on the first Sunday of every month in both churches. The census confirms that the attendance has increased post-covid, however, as part of Project Wellspring it is our mission to continue to grow and encourage others back to Mass. The average per Mass is as follows: Sat 5pm: 100, Sun 10.30am: 213, Sun 12noon: 20, Sun 5pm: 44. This gives us an average of 377 people attending Mass, with a Catholic population of approx 1200. What can be done to improve this number? How do we get people back? Let us know!

#### **New Security Fencing**

For many years St Mary's piazza has become a social gathering for young people, especially at lunch time, and then again in the evening. Over the last few months we have experienced antisocial behaviour and damage to the property. After erecting a fence at the side of the church we are now entering the next phase of our security measures and erecting a gate at the Clubrooms gas meter and railings along the wall. The work will cost around £3,000 and will be completed next month. This is an expense we should not have to make, but unfortunately in todays world it is required to keep our church safe and prevent damage.

#### **Readers Guidelines**

Through the Liturgy of the Word, God speaks to his people, and therefore, it is important that His Word is proclaimed in a dignified manner, and that people are ready to listen. Below are a few guidelines in order to allow the readings to penetrate the hearts and minds of those who are listening.

**When to move:** The Reader should <u>start</u> to move forward when the congregation respond "Amen" to the Opening Prayer. This will give the congregation enough time to be seated and settled for the beginning of the Liturgy of the Word.

**Announcing the Readings:** We do not need to say "The First Reading" or "The Second Reading" we simply proclaim, "A reading from..." and continue the reading; reading slowly and clearly in order for people to listen to God speak through you.

**Responsorial Psalm:** Again we do not need to say phrases such as, "The Responsorial Psalm" or "The Response is", simply read the Response at the beginning and look up for the congregation to repeat. At the end of each verse again simply look up to indicate to the congregation to respond.

**Gospel Acclamation:** The Gospel Acclamation will be sung by the choir/priest or omitted, therefore, after the Psalm or the Second Reading, please return to your place.

### **St Augustine's Sermon On Pastors**

Do what they say, not what they do

"Well then, shepherds, hear the word of the Lord!" What must you shepherds hear? Thus says the Lord God: behold, I am above the shepherds and I will call them to account for the sheep in their hands.

Listen, sheep of God, listen and learn: God will call the bad shepherds to account for his sheep and for their deaths. As he says elsewhere in Ezekiel: Son of man, I have appointed you as sentry to the House of Israel. When you hear a word from my mouth, warn them in my name. If I say to a wicked man, "Wicked wretch, you are to die," and you do not speak to warn the wicked man to renounce his ways, then he shall die for his sin but I will hold you responsible



for his death. If, however, you do warn a wicked man to renounce his ways and repent, and he does not repent, then he shall die for his sin but you yourself will have saved your life.

You see, brethren? Do you see how dangerous it is to keep quiet? If you remain silent, you die; and rightly. You die for your impiety and sin – it is your negligence that kills you. He who has said, As I live, says the Lord might have found a living shepherd – but since the shepherd was negligent, not warning those he had been given authority over, those whose sentry he was, he will die justly and the sentry will be justly condemned. But if – the Lord continues – you say "you are to die" to one I have threatened with the sword, and he does not avoid the sword and it comes and kills him, he will die in his sin but you will have set your soul free. That is why we must not keep silent – and you, even if we did keep silent, must listen to the words of the true Shepherd in holy Scripture.

Since I raised the question, let us see if he takes the sheep from the dead shepherds and gives them to good ones. I certainly see him taking the sheep from the bad shepherds: *I am above the shepherds, and I shall take my flock back from them and I shall not allow them to feed my flock. In this way the shepherds will stop feeding themselves. For when I say to them, "Feed my sheep," they feed themselves and not my sheep. I shall not allow them to feed my flock.* 

How does he stop them from looking after his sheep? Do whatever they say, but do not do what they do. It is as if he were saying, "Their words are my words but their actions are their own." When you avoid what the bad shepherds do, they are not in charge of you any more: when you follow what they say, it is my words you are following and it is I who am tending you.
